A series of Discussions on Reparations and Repair based on reading the book: “The *Color of Law*,” by Richard Rothstein

While the Emancipation Proclamation ended legal slavery 160 years ago, the Color of Law explains how federal, state, and local governments in the 20th Century deliberately and systematically imposed racial neighborhood segregation with undisguised racial zoning; public housing that purposefully segregated previously mixed communities; subsidies for builders to create whites-only suburbs; tax exemptions for institutions that enforced segregation; and support for violent resistance to African Americans in white Neighborhoods. The result is segregated and unequal education and the ability of whites to build generational wealth through home ownership which is denied to Blacks.

This will transform our understanding of twentieth- century urban history and force us to face the obligation to remedy our unconstitutional past.

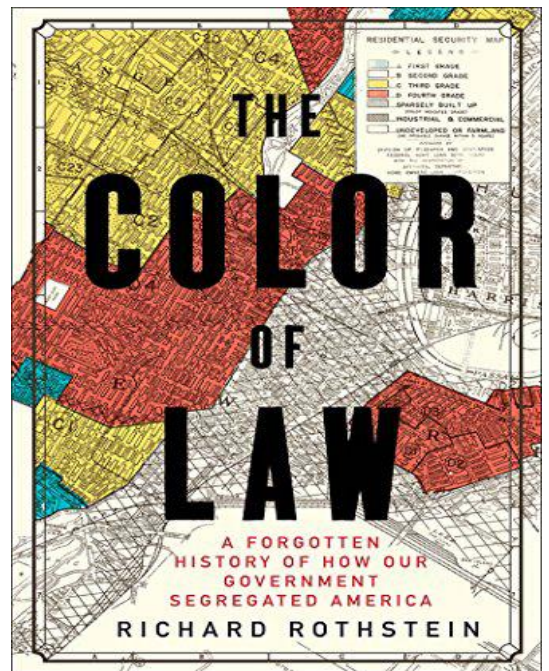
